LMB Has New Police Headquarters

LMB's Police Headquarters had been located in the basement of Borough Hall. The space was extremely problematic for the Department - no holding cells to secure and detain criminals or interviewing prisoners. Records became mildewed within a short period of time and filing cabinets rusted due to the damp conditions. Detainees were kept in the same area utilized for the public, which did not provide privacy, security or safety. The steps leading to Headquarters were uneven, steep stone that were hazardous and did not comply with the

American with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. The space was technologically outdated and posed accessibility, health and safety concerns. Thanks to grants from the Bucks County Redevelopment Authority (RDA), LMB was able to expand the Administration Building and now has space appropriate for officers, the public and detainees. Security cameras and monitors have also been updated. We also need to give a special thanks to Hulmeville Borough as it sponsored LMB's RDA application for gaming monies.



On June 16th, LMB will host a ribbon cutting to dedicate the new space. All are welcome to join from 10:00 am - noon for tours and light refreshments to help celebrate the finished project.

Storm Water Management

Federal regulations enacted in December 1999 require Langhorne Manor Borough to improve on their existing storm water management program over the next five years. Storm water runoff occurs when water from rain or snow and ice melting flows over the ground. Storm water becomes a problem when it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants as it flows or when it causes flooding and erosion of streambanks.

Here are some of the most important ways for Borough residents to prevent storm water pollution:

- Properly dispose of hazardous substances.
- Use pesticides, fertilizers and herbicides properly
- Install innovative storm water practices on residential properties.
- Report any discharge from storm water outfalls during times of dry weather.

- Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly.
- Store materials that could pollute water indoors and use containers for outdoor storage.

Important Reminder...

With the nicer weather, residents are usually thinking about making changes to their homes and property. Most if not all changes or additions to any structure on your property, or adding structures will need a permit. Please contact the borough office for the detailed list of permit requirements.

* Lawn Signs - The borough requires permits for all approved signage. Even the small contrac-

tor signs and political signs are regulated by ordinance. Please make sure you check with the borough office before placing any sign on your property. Also, keep in mind that placing approved signs on property other than yours is prohibited.

* On Street Parking - On street parking overnight is prohibited on all borough roads. Please ensure all vehicles are removed from the borough roads before sundown.

* Material Deliveries - Remember all material deliveries must be unloaded, staged or piled on your property only. Placing any delivered materials (even temporarily) on borough roads is strictly prohibited.

Langhorne Manor Borough is a friendly residential community located in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, 18 miles from downtown Philadelphia. The picturesque neighborhood displays stately older mansions as well as recently constructed homes, all on beautifully manicured tree-lined streets.

Mayor Robert Byrne presides over 0.65 square miles and 1,440 people living in the Manor. Incorporated in 1890, Langhorne Manor was named for the area's first landowners, the Langhorne's. Several historical landmarks and the Cairn University are located within Langhorne Manor Borough.
